Michelle Murphy was born on September 15, 1968, in Shelbyville, Indiana. A Christian family adopted her as a baby. She attended church faithfully and was actively involved. Her father worked in many ministries at the church one of which was the bus ministry. In fact, when Pastor Murphy was a little boy her father was his bus captain. Mrs. Murphy was saved at the age of seven in junior church. She said, "I had been raised in church and knew all the Bible stories and the Romans road, but I realized that Sunday I had never made the decision to accept Christ." She surrendered her life to God as a

teenager during summer camp.

From kindergarten to the time she graduated from college Mrs. Murphy loved school. Her favorite subjects were math and history. She loved sports. She played basketball, softball, volleyball, and was a cheerleader. Her favorite sport was volleyball.

Mr. And Mrs. Murphy met at church when they were teenagers in high school. They both attended Hyles Anderson College where Mrs. Murphy studied Elementary Education. They got married after Mr. Murphy graduated.

The Murphy's came to California to work on staff at First Baptist Church in downtown Long Beach. She taught 4th grade, 5th grade, and a 5th grade and 6th grade combination class during the nine years she worked at FBC. In the year 2000, the Murphy's came to Gethsemane Baptist Church. Mrs. Murphy taught 5th and 6th grade and 3rd and 4th grade classes in the school. In 2006, she became the school secretary. She says that what she loves about this job is that there is no homework. She loves what she does. Her advice for the students is "Appreciate what you have, not just your possessions, but the people in your life." We really appreciate Mrs. Murphy!

Who's That Author: O. Henry

William Sidney Porter was born on September 11, 1862, in Greensboro, North Carolina. When William was three his mother died from tuberculosis, and he and his father moved into the home of his maternal grandmother. As a child, Porter was always reading anything and everything from classics to dime novels. In 1876, he graduated from his aunt's elementary school and then enrolled at the Lindsey Street High School. In 1879, he started working in his uncle's drugstore. At the age of nineteen, he was licensed as a pharmacist. As he grew older, he led an active social life in Austin by joining various music and drama groups. He even displayed his artistic talent by

sketching the townsfolk. Porter later met and began dating Athol Estes, who was seventeen years old at the time and from a wealthy family. They were married on July 1, 1887. Porter began working at the First National Bank of Austin as a teller and bookkeeper. In 1894 he was accused by the bank of embezzlement and lost his job. In February of 1898 he was found guilty of embezzlement and sentenced to five years in jail; he was imprisoned on March 25, 1898. He had fourteen stories published under various pseudonyms while he was in prison, but was becoming best known as "O. Henry". friend of his in New Orleans would forward his stories to

publishers so they had no idea the writer was imprisoned. He was soon released from prison for good behavior, serving only three years. He later re-located to New York, where he wrote 381 short stories. He wrote a story a week for over a year for the New York World Sunday Magazine. His wit, characterization, and plot twists were adored by his readers, but were often panned heavily by critics. Porter was a heavy drinker, and his health declined dramatically 1908, which began to affect his writing. He died on June 5, 1910, and was buried in the Riverside Cemetery in Asheville, North Carolina.



Food For Thought: Peeps

Just Born, a candy manufacturer in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, was founded by a Russian immigrant named Sam Born. In 1953 this candy company obtained another candy company called Roda Candy Company which happened to be a main producer of marshmallow "chicks" (baby chickens). Then they went from hand making their candy to mass producing it. Originally these candies were yel-

low and chick shaped, but eventually the company started making different colors, shapes, and sizes. In 2009 the company introduced Peeps Lip Balm in four flavors: grape, strawberry, vanilla, and cotton candy. In November of that same year they opened their first Peeps & Co. in Prince George's County, Pennsylvania. Two variations of Peeps are pumpkin shaped for Halloween, and heart shaped for Valentine's Day. Ingredients include Marshmallow, corn syrup, gelatin, and carnauba wax.
