
## Who can find a virtuous woman?

"Christmas is a baby shower that went totally overboard." -ANDY BOROWITZ The emphasis in this chapter is not placed on all the stuff she did; it is on the fact that she was virtuous. That's the point! Let's now look at someone else who was known for virtue. Jesus.

Mark 5:30, "And Jesus, immediately knowing in Himself that **virtue** had gone out of Him, turned Him about in the press, and said, Who touched My clothes?"

This is the story of the woman with the issue of blood who, in her last chance of being healed, touched the hem of Jesus' garment and was miraculously healed. Jesus knew that she had purposely touched Him in faith because virtue had gone out of Him. Virtue in this verse means "power or a mighty work." Logic with me: if virtue went out of Him, that means virtue had to have been inside of Him. When the virtue left Him, who did it affect? The woman who touched Him! Let's now tie this together with our desire as women to be that rare find, that virtuous woman.

Virtue comes from touching Jesus!

We do not become virtuous by checking off some list of things we are "supposed" to do. Virtue comes from being close to Jesus, close enough to touch Him. No doubt as we are filled with His power we will do virtuous things by default. The love of God will compel us to love others. An inner gratitude will urge us to give and to be a wise steward of our money. A love for God will cause us to work willingly in home and ministry. We are not performing these actions to become virtuous but because we are virtuous.

So many miss the point. We can work so hard to look like a virtuous woman instead of spending time with Jesus every day so we can actually be a virtuous woman. How exhausting it must be to keep up a façade all the time instead of the real us being virtuous.

Sometimes the "clean" button on our dishwasher will be lit up, but when I grab a mug from the rack, it is dirty on the inside. We can clean a mug's outside, and the inside still be dirty, but when we thoroughly clean the inside, it's hard

not to affect the outside. If our focus is getting the inside of us truly clean, inevitably the outside is going to see some improvement too. The closer we get to Jesus the more He rubs off on us. What virtuous attributes rub off? Oh, things like love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance. If you and I saw a woman with all these attributes, we would definitely call her virtuous! Remember the goal as you read Proverbs 31: it's not to do all the things, it's to be virtuous. I will close with this question: Is your emphasis on the doing or the being?
